## ON THE FRONT LINES

#### **COVID-19 Response Continues**

- From January February, the Food Bank receipted 1,619,215 lbs. and distributed 1,622,518 lbs. of food.
- 266,937 lbs. of mixed dairy, produce, and mixed meat distributed through the USDA Coronavirus Food Assistance Program Farmers to Families Boxes.
- 30 mobile food distributions served 7,680 households/27,765 individuals and distributed 426,279 lbs. of food in our six-county service area.
- >> 915 volunteers provided 2,972 volunteer hours.
- **2,445 households/10,040 individuals served** at the Community Food Pantry of St. Joseph County.

## HUNGRY NEIGHBORS COUNT ON US

2020 has been like no other year for our community, our country, and the world. So many things changed almost overnight. For one, the need for food became exponentially amplified as so

many households were impacted by loss of employment in full or in part, school sponsored meal programs were not as accessible, and community-based meal programs dwindled or ceased to operate. People who thought they would never have a need to seek assistance from a food bank began receiving something we all need to survive, the basic and precious resource of food. In 2019, the Food Bank of Northern Indiana distributed 8.8 million pounds of food compared to 11.9 million pounds of food in 2020 delivered pandemic style, through no-contact mobile pantries. These mobile pantries were deployed across the six counties the Food Bank serves, maneuvering enhanced access to serve more people in need. This would have never been possible without the countless volunteer hours, the community and business partnerships, and the generosity of donors that came together in support of the Food Bank of Northern Indiana and our community in these unprecedented times.

Through its network of 140 active agency partners, the Food Bank of Northern Indiana distributed 11.9 million lbs. of food through food pantries, soup kitchens, shelters, and daycare facilities in Elkhart, Kosciusko, LaPorte, Marshall, Starke, and St. Joseph Counties. In addition, we directly provide food to people in need through our Food 4 Kids Backpack Program, Healthy Choices Market, Senior Nutrition Program, Senior Healthy Choices Market, Mobile Food Pantry Program, Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP), and The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP).



#### **Agency Spotlight**

The Center – Family Christian Development Center 107 E Marion Street, Nappanee, IN 46550 (574) 773-2149

This pantry is open Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1 p.m. – 3:45 p.m. Guests may visit this food pantry up to three times per month.



The Center, Family Christian Development Center, was founded in 1996 by Joan Andrew when she began distributing food to people in need at The Meadows trailer park on the west side of Nappanee.

Current programs include the Food Pantry, Clothing Closet, Medication Assistance Program, Infant Immunization Clinic, Rent and Utility Assistance, Friday Back Pack Program, and Summer Lunch Program.

In a typical year, the Center has more than 11,000 individual contacts with residents in its service area of the WaNee Community School District.

Team members moved into The Center's new building in December 2020. It is the freshly renovated Central School property that previously housed the Boys & Girls Clubs of Elkhart County Nappanee Club. This 11,500-square-foot facility includes administrative, program, and storage space. The biggest change is a welcome one — one floor! The previous space had three floors with no elevator.

The Center serves residents of the WaNee Community School District — Nappanee and Wakarusa.



### Senior Nutrition Program

Through February 2021, the Senior Nutrition Program served 1,538 seniors received

15,592 lbs. of food in Elkhart, Kosciusko, LaPorte, Marshall, Starke, and St. Joseph Counties.

#### **Community Food Pantry of St. Joseph County**

Through February 2021, the Community Food Pantry of St. Joseph County served 2,245 households/10,040 individuals and distributed 264,201 lbs. of food.

#### **Commodity Supplemental Food Program**

Through February 2021, 885 seniors in Elkhart, LaPorte, Marshall, and St. Joseph Counties received 128,998 lbs. of food.

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## VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT!

Volunteers are needed Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. – 4 p.m. for various projects. The Community Food Pantry is open for outdoor drive-thru distributions on Mondays and Fridays from 9 a.m. – 2 p.m. and Wednesday from 11 a.m. – 5 p.m.

A two-hour time commitment is preferred. Safety protocols are in place to ensure that you have a great experience, including having your temperature taken upon entering the building, mandatory mask wearing, plastic gloves, hand sanitizer and hand washing stations located throughout the building, and 6 ft. physical distancing practiced with all projects.

If you live outside of St. Joseph County and would like to volunteer, we can use your support at our mobile food distributions taking place in Elkhart, Kosciusko, LaPorte, Marshall, and Starke Counties, or we can put you in touch with one of our pantry partners in your community.

## TUUD FINDERS

To meet the demand for emergency food assistance, the Food Bank actively seeks manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers, food growers, packers, and grocers to procure more protein, produce, dairy, and shelf-stable items to distribute through our network of agency partners.

Through February 2021, the Food Bank distributed 1,622,518 lbs. and receipted 1,619,215 lbs. of product. During this period, 731,044 lbs. of government commodities were distributed and 845,929 lbs. were receipted.

Our Agency Direct Pick-Up Program receipted 193,670 lbs. in Elkhart, Kosciusko, LaPorte, and Marshall Counties through February 2021. This program began in November 2018, with agency partners working with Food Bank retail partners in Elkhart, LaPorte, Marshall, and Kosciusko Counties to pick up product Monday through Friday.
